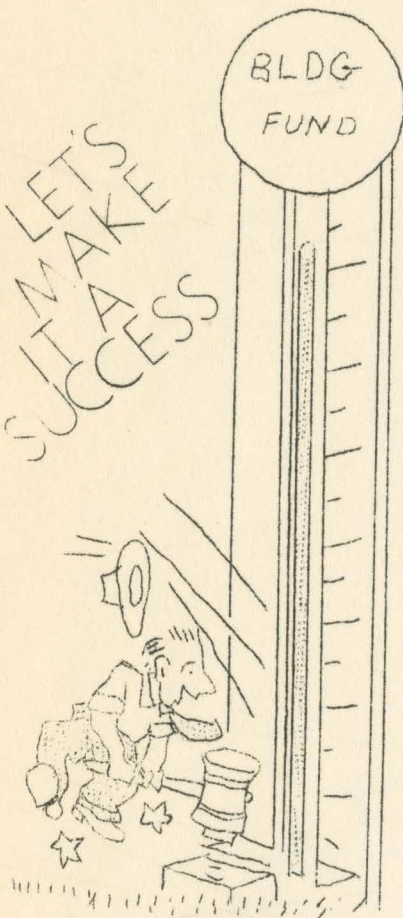
B L O O D D O N O R S

SAVE YOUR MONEY. PUT IT IN YOUR CREDIT UNION. OPEN SATURDAY 9 to 1.

Suppose you start your saving from the top of the pile instead of the bottom. Suppose, next pay day, you take out of your pay, before anything else, the \$1. or \$2. you would like to put into a reserve fund. Then try to get along on the rest.

You will be surprised to see how easy that is. You might even find it possible to save more than \$2, and you will get so much pleasure out of seeing the fund grow that you will not think of the weekly saving as a hardship at all. It will very soon become a habit, and the natural thing to do each pay day FIRST.

Of course, the one thing to do with these savings is to put them into your CREDIT UNION. That is one of the big advantages of the CREDIT UNION - it is right here at hand on pay days, ready to accept your savings before they get away.

Let's see you at the Credit Union Office next pay day. Make up your mind now to start "saving from the top of the pile."
